Module - COVID-19 and Global Pandemics

Overview

The COVID-19 virus, declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organization (WHO) in March 2020, has had significant impacts on health systems worldwide. This module will use a wide-scoped approach to discuss the way it has affected various sectors, from healthcare to populations. You will begin by exploring the definition of a pandemic, and how a disease can go from a local issue to a global one. You will then investigate the widespread repercussions that COVID-19 has had on health systems and populations around the world. Finally, you will look at Canada's response to the pandemic with a critical lens, exploring the strengths, weaknesses and difficulties involved in its response.

- Understand the concept of a global pandemic and the factors involved in its development as well as its identification.
- Discuss the worldwide response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and how this experience may shape the future of healthcare
- Explore the impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on various populations and health systems around the world

WHO Interactive Timeline

- The WHO declared COVID-19 a global pandemic on March 11, 2020. Based on the timeline, does this surprise you? Do you think this reaction was justified at the time?
- What do you think of the statistics of COVID-19 cases in different countries? How does this change over time? Does this seem to reflect real-world events during early 2020?
