

MentorNet Module Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR)

Overview:

This module aims to provide an introduction to the field of SRHR and its many relevant sub-topics in a global health context. Moreover, the module presents strategies for achieving the SDGs.

- 1. **Part 1** introduces the broad field of SRHR by situating it within the lens of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), namely goals 3, 5 and 10, and by providing context about the gaps in SRHR around the world. Click here for more information on the SDGs.
- 2. **Part 2** covers key issues in Reproductive Health, such as abortion care, family planning and menstrual health.
- 3. **Part 3** covers important concepts in Sexual Health, such as sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and sex- and gender-based violence.

- To understand the importance of SRHR public health programs for attaining health equity, social justice and the SDGs.
