Chair's Message

Welcome to the 2023 annual report of the Canadian Association for Global Health! This year was marked by significant success, but also significant change at the organization. We had the distinct pleasure of being guided by new Executive Director Nafissatou Diop this year. Nafi brought a wealth of experience in global health from her roots in Senegal, to her time at IDRC and beyond. She took on the ED role with grace and focus – thank you Nafi!

Between June and September 2023, CAGH undertook a strategic planning exercise including a facilitated deliberative process with a full committee and staff and member consultations. This resulted in a new strategic document that positions the organization as a convener, partner and champion for global health equity. Our vision of a vibrant global health community creating a healthier and more equitable world remains. We will continue to be guided by our mission to connect, engage, and mobilize a strong global health community across Canada and internationally in support of health equity over the next five years.

Many CAGH achievements from 2023 are detailed in this report. I would like to highlight our ongoing work with the Canadian Association for HIV Research and the K2A project, a newly approved World Vision partnership, expansion of our student and emerging professional network with seven student chapters, submission of a new Global Affairs Canada grant, the facilitation of a very successful conference, Health Systems Global (HSG) Secretariat activities and so much more. A huge thank you goes out to all our staff and volunteers for their hard work and dedication to CAGH!

At the same time as all these activities were taking place however, CAGH was also facing financial and administrative challenges. We required more sustainable sources of core funding and had to update and streamline some of our administrative functions. Due to rising demands within the partnership and the desire to focus centrally, the Board also made the decision to end the HSG project early. This had very significant financial implications and resulted in a pause in operations. There was significant downsizing of staff and projects at the end of October 2023. There were also a number of changes within the Board as it moved from an advising to a working-board model.

Over the months of November and December 2023, the remaining Board and staff members were able to stabilize the financial situation, close the physical office space, update some financial and record keeping systems and enter with a renewed sense of hope and purpose for CAGH into 2024. I would personally like to thank all the staff and Board for their work throughout 2023 and particularly in the last few months. It was certainly a challenging year for the organization, but I believe that CAGH has used this moment to refocus on the goal of being the most effective convener, partner and champion for global health equity that it can be. I look forward to working with all CAGH members and partners in pursuing this goal together for the coming two years of my term as Chair.

29th Canadian Conference on Global Health

From Rhetoric to Action: Moving Policy, Research, and Practice

The 2023 Canadian Conference on Global Health (CCGH 2023) was held from October 16th to 18th, in Ottawa, and was delivered in a hybrid format.

The nature of global health is arguably centered on health equity, inclusivity, and research and practice. Global health addresses transnational health issues, is multidisciplinary, and takes a multisectoral approach. Each of these aspects, in addition to other aspects inherent to global health, have been studied, considered, and discussed to varying degrees. For example, there are numerous epidemiological studies mapping the prevalence of HIV, TB, malaria, and so forth, but we know that these diseases and other global health challenges exist. Prioritizing continued publication and discussion of such issues, although valuable, may not always translate into practice.

Now what is often missing is an emphasis on moving from rhetoric to action.

What do we need to do next to take the knowledge we have to advance policy, research, and practice in light of resource constraints and lack of political will? We are at an opportune time to consider how we can act in our roles as scientists, practitioners, clinicians, advocates, citizens, and many others, to deliver evidence-informed and tangible outcomes.

CCGH 2023 aimed to explore how we can turn rhetoric in global health, whether that be in terms of program and policy implementation, practice, or advocacy, into action to deliver positive results to the beneficiaries of global health efforts.

Sub-themes addressed through the plenaries included:

- How do we ensure no one is left behind?
- Fostering partnerships with shared benefits in global health
- How are innovation, technology, and digital health transforming global health?
- Unpacking the role of policy and politics in global health



CCGH 2023 drew in 1,263 participants with 355 in-person and 908 virtual – global health practitioners, students, university partners, civil society and government representatives – from 40 countries. 58.30% of the registrants self-identified as women.


